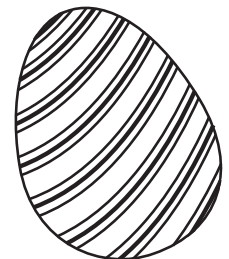
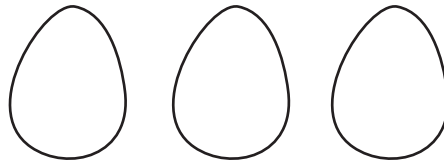
Use this map to help you find the **6 eggs** in the Museum of Natural History.

2. SNAKE EGGS

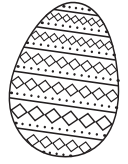
Did you know that some snakes lay eggs?

3. NEST INVADERS!

Some birds are brood parasites, meaning that they lay their eggs in the nest of other types of bird. This saves the time and energy of looking after their own young.



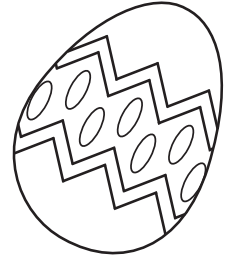
The eggs are similar to the host birds own eggs to stop that bird rejecting them from the nest. **Can you spot the odd egg out in the 3 groups of eggs on display?**

4. BIGGEST & SMALLEST

Can you draw the echidna?

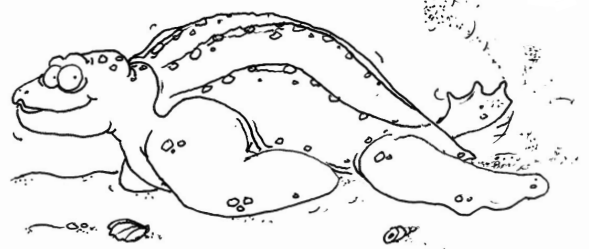
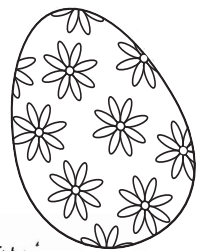


6. DINOSAUR EGGS

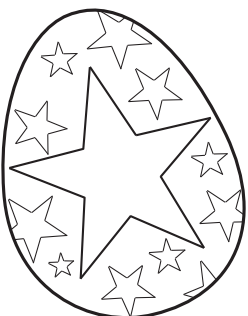
Can you spot four dinosaur eggs on the touch table? It is likely that they were laid by a long-necked plant-eating dinosaur.

Hint: Look at the label in front.



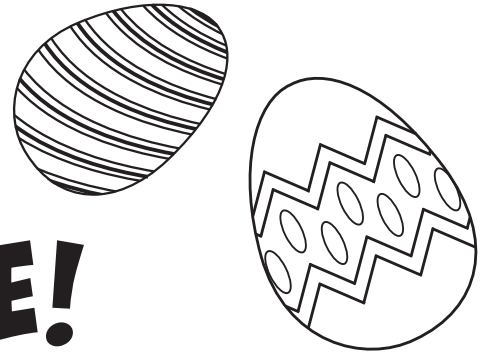

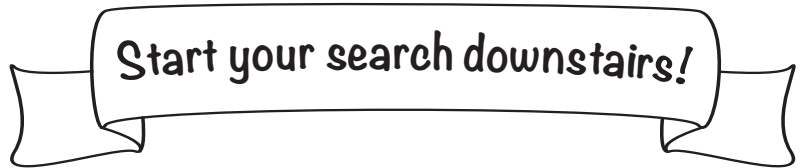
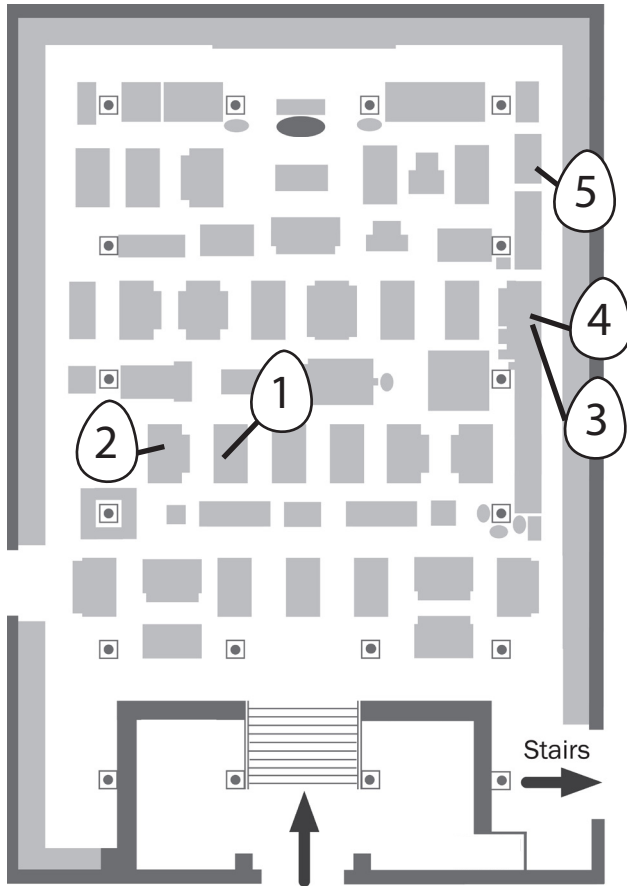

4. EASTER LAMB

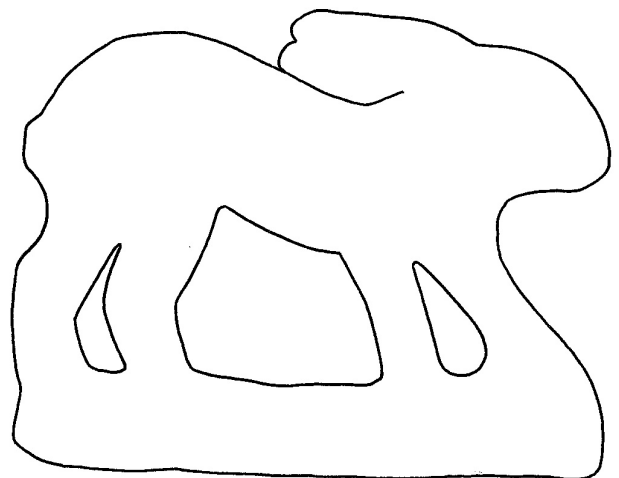
Open the drawer C.30.10 below to find an Easter Lamb.

B. Sugar

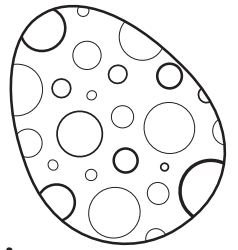

What else can you see in this drawer?

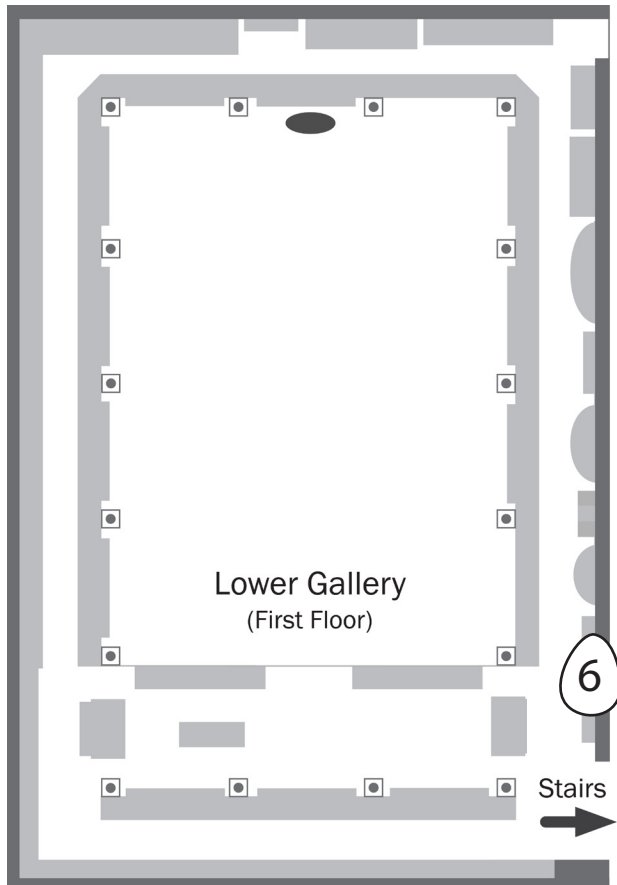
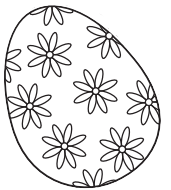
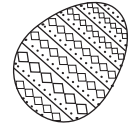

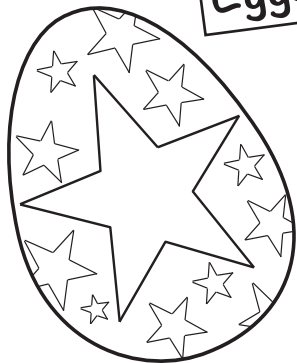
6. PAINTED EASTER EGGS

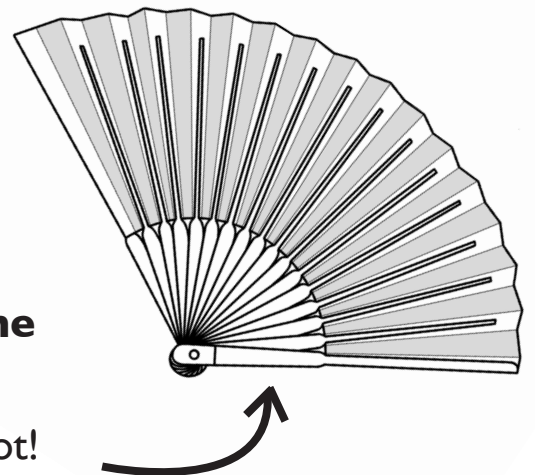
Eggstra Egg Challenge!
