

# TATE JUSTICE MUSEUM LATE NIGHT Event Map: GROUND FLOOR PITT RIVERS MUSEUM



**7pm-9pm** Film from *Court of Intergenerational Climate Crimes: The British East India Company on Trial*, by Dutch artist and propaganda researcher Jonas Staal and Indian activist and lawyer Radha D'Souza. Commissioned by Serpentine, London and in collaboration with Framer Framed, Amsterdam, CREAM and Centre for Law, Development and Conflict Studies (University of Westminster). CICC puts the British East India Company on trial for crimes against lives, landscapes and livelihoods in the past, present and future. The hearings took place on 4-6 April 2025 at Ambika P3, London.
